Queen Elizabeth Blvd. Traffic Calming Update—July 2014

Neighbors,

Many of you have asked about the status of QEB; we thank you for your interest! We are still hard at work, meeting among ourselves, with Supervisor Cook's office, and FCDOT to incorporate your comments into a workable plan.

Here is a quick overview of the process: A community member forms a task force which contacts the Board of Supervisors to request a traffic calming study. The request is shared with FCDOT, which conducts a 24-hour traffic count and speed survey. To qualify for consideration of a traffic calming plan, the street must have between 600-6000 vehicles per day, 15% of which must be over 30 mph. If those qualifications have been met, a proposed traffic calming plan is designed and presented to the Supervisor's office and the task force. From there the community becomes more involved; a homeowner who would potentially have a device (stop sign, speed hump, etc.) placed directly in front of their home are invited to sign an Affected Resident Form giving their approval. If that has been achieved, the community is notified of and invited to a community meeting where the traffic calming plan is presented and explained. After the community meeting, the homeowners in the ballot area receive a mailed ballot to vote on the proposed plan; votes are tallied by Supervisor Cook's office. If the plan is approved, FCDOT will schedule the installation of the traffic calming measures. If the

plan is not approved, the process stops and that particular location cannot be addressed again for two years.

A community meeting was held on May 29 where we presented the following plan: a three-way stop at the intersection of QEB and Woodland Way plus three speed humps (adjacent to 8819 and 8821 QEB, adjacent to 8708 QEB, and adjacent to 8524 and 8526 QEB). We heard many questions and concerns from our neighbors and are considering all the input very seriously. One thing that seemed evident is many neighbors support the threeway stop...some would say it's long overdue! However, the three speed humps are a little more controversial. We are now in the process of adjusting the proposal to reflect a plan more amenable to the community. Once we have a new/ adjusted plan, we will hold another community meeting and welcome your attendance. You are strongly encouraged to attend, this is your opportunity to participate in creating a safer community.

American Disposal Rate Update

Right now most of you who are signed up with American Disposal Service are paying \$23.00 a month for once-a-week service (that includes trash/recycle/yard debris). ADS has agreed to **\$18.00 a month** for the once-a-week service (and only \$20 for twice a week!)

If you want to get this rate (for either the once or twice a week service), you must call 703-368-0500 and tell them that you are part of CANTERBURY WOODS and want to get the new rate.

If you have some other trash service (like TripleA/Republic) and would like to switch over to ADS, plasse call the number above -- and don't forget to cancel with your other trash company.

Marker Maintenance Opening

After MANY years of attentive care, Tom and Pam Reinkober are retiring as our Marker Maintenance coordinators. We need a person (or persons/co-chairs) to step up and help us keep the CW entrance markers looking neat and attractive.

Duties include:

Coordinating Marker Maintenance both in the spring and fall for the Southampton and Wakefield Markers. Usually we have between 15-20 volunteers who will attend. During the cleanups we pull weeds, cut both trees and bushes as needed and put down mulch, plant flowers and bushes when they need to be replaced. We also pick up trash from Wakefield Chapel to Stonehaven Drive as our Civic Association has adopted that part of Braddock Road as part of the Adopt-A-Highway Program.

Securing the grass cutting contract for the median on Woodland Way and the entrance to Southampton. [Note: at this time we have a contract in place.] The contract covers the grass cutting and edging from April to November. On a monthly basis the coordinator usually makes at least one visit to each marker to spray for weeds and cut bushes and remove old flowers that have already bloomed.

Why You Need to Sign Up for the CW Community Email

Did you know that in late May a woman was accosted by someone as she was jogging on the trail near the bridge to the pool?

Were you aware of all the changes that are being proposed for Braddock Road?

Do you ever wish you could get feedback or references for a landscaper, electrician, roofer, plumber, etc.? Do you feel out of the loop when your neighbors are talking about CW social events, contests, fundraisers, plant swaps, etc.?

All of this information and more can be had if you sign up for the CW community email (also referred to as the listserv). You do NOT have to change your email address and you will NOT get spam as a result of signing up. You WILL get useful timely information.

Here's how:

You must register with Yahoo! to join the CW email. Registering is FREE and you can use *any* email address to receive posts from listserv. In other words, you will not have another email address to check; the community emails will come to the email address you designate!

Go to www.yahoo.com

If you are a current member of Yahoo!, sign in. If you are registering for the first time, click on "sign in" and click on "create a new account."

Once you are signed in, click the "groups" tab on the left hand side of the homepage.

In the "find a Yahoo! group" box, type canterburywoodsca.

From this point, follow the on-screen instructions to participate in the group.
